List four issues that may impact breastfeeding an infant with ankyloglossia.

Describe what clinical managements are needed to assist in the resolution of breastfeeding difficulties related to engorgement and hyperlactation.

MODULE 7 Supplementation

List three medically indicated reasons an infant may require supplementation.

Describe how and why to effectively and clearly teach safe preparation of human milk substitutes to caregivers of infants who are being feed human milk substitutes.

List three alternative feeding methods that can support breastfeeding while supplementing.
